

# My visit to Jells Park



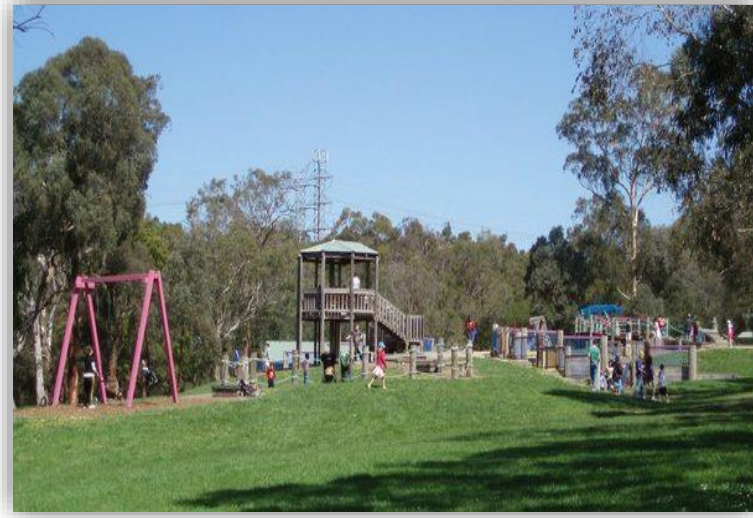
When I arrive at the park, we will park in the carpark. I need to stay close to my adult to stay safe.

# Please don't feed us!

Ducks in this park often approach people "begging" for food. But by feeding them you can establish a dangerous dependence that can eventually kill them.

- Wild animals can become aggressive if they expect food, even chasing after visitors. They forget this learned behaviour if people stop feeding them.
- Ducks naturally feed on algae, invertebrates and fish. If they eat bread they get fat, sick and dependent on people, as well as becoming easy targets for foxes and cats.
